The guest for the 2019 Ruina Dinner was Ernest Moniz, the U.S. Secretary of Energy from 2013 to 2017 and emeritus faculty member in the MIT Department of Physics. In his remarks, Dr. Moniz reflected on a range of issues related to nonproliferation and arms control, and offered his insights on contemporary challenges and opportunities in nuclear policy.

Mr. Simon, a Professor in the Practice of International Relations at Colby College, also previously held positions the State Department and National Security Council during the Obama and Clinton administrations, and is an expert on a wide range of Middle Eastern issues. In his presentation, he offered an analysis of the current policy landscape in the Middle East, and participated in a Q&A with attendees, before joining SSP Faculty and guests for a dinner at the Samberg Conference Center.
